Robins

We have had a very busy half term.

Robins have really enjoyed developing their reading comprehension skills and writing skills whilst reading 'The True Story of the Three Little Pigs' as well as 'How to wash a Woolly Mammoth.' They have really enjoyed linking their reading to their Design and Technology project and are currently finishing sewing their finger puppets in the shape of a pig. Reception and Key Stage 1 will be able to retell the story with the puppets. They are looking forward to bringing their puppets home soon.

Robins are thrilled to have more iPads available to use in class and are keen to use them for Numbots and Times Tables Rock Stars during maths morning work. They are also using them to create music as part of their computing and music curriculum.

Their knowledge of London Landmarks during geography sessions have developed steadily and they are remembering lots of facts about places like Tower Bridge and Buckingham Palace. Next term, during History sessions we are learning about 'The Great Fire of London.'

In dance, they have developed their sense of balance and ability to use a variety of jumps and spins whilst story-telling and moving as well as developing sports multi-skills in P.E. During music, they have been developing their vocabulary to describe the instruments, voices and structure of music and have started to record music as a written graphic score.

In science, they are keen to develop their science investigation skills (and are having to be patient) to see the results of their 'changes over time' investigation observing changes in their height periodically over the year. The topic in science has been and will continue to be (after half term) about animals and their habitats with lots of investigations outside as the weather warms up.

World Book Day Thursday 3rd March

Plans for World Book Day are taking shape and will include a number of book focused activities and competition throughout the week. On the actual day we will be having a 'book character day', but it will not be fully dressing up as a book character, so please do not spend money on outfits. The idea is to have a 'nod' to a character – maybe one item of clothing, a prop or a hairstyle. Miss Brown wil be sending out information after half term. We will be using this day to raise some money to buy some newly released books for the school library.



Kingfishers

This term in Kingfishers we have been busy with many areas of the curriculum. We started this term with our history topic Ancient Greece, the children have developed their knowledge of the ancient world, how it is ruled, what architectural styles they used and the types of buildings they had in their towns.

In science we have been doing many investigations into the properties of materials and states of matter, the children have learnt what a solution is and how a solution can be separated by evaporation, sieving and filtering.

In English our text this term has been The Switch by Anthony Horowitz, this has been an exciting adventure story to study and the children have written some fantastic suspense writing, that keeps the reader on the edge of their seat!

In maths Year 6 have been focusing on percentages and decimals and preparing for their upcoming SATs tests. Year 5 have been working on fractions, including addition and subtraction of these. Both year groups are developing great fluency skills and are beginning to be able to apply these in problem solving situations well.

Other highlights in the curriculum have been swimming, learning about the Christian Bible in R.E and most recently editing our own school movies on the new iPads. Next term, we will continue to learn more about the Ancient Greeks, their beliefs and the first Olympic games. Our next text in English is a modern American text, which is very different to any other we have studied before. With this text we will continue to develop our writing for different genres and audiences. In Maths Year 6 can look forward to developing their Algebra knowledge and Year 5 will continue to develop their fractions multiplying and dividing fractions! Science next term we will be developing the children's knowledge of light and continue to develop of scientific investigation skills. We also have D&T next term where we will be sewing cushion covers and in P.E the children will continue their outdoor lessons with Mr Puckey and gymnastics with Miss Brown.

Attendance

Our whole school attendance is currently at 91.79%. Well done to Hawks Class for the best class attendance and Year 5 who have the best year group attendance for the year so far. We would also like to say congratulations to Delilah W, Cayden M and Kaycie H who, despite all the bugs and Covid cases that we've had so far this year, have managed 100% attendance! Well done you three! Most of the children who were off with Covid continue to be on an upward trend and the reduction in isolation times has made a difference to some of our most recent Covid sufferers. Hopefully in the next half of the year we will see our attendance figures going up.

Below are some interesting facts and figures. It is worth noting too that poor attendance not only affects children academically but can also have an adverse effect on their Mental Health and well-being too.

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96% attendance is:	8 days absence per year from school
	the equivalent to 11 weeks missed over 7 primary school years
95% attendance is:	10 days absence per year from school
	70 days or 14 weeks missed from a child's primary school education
90% attendance is:	19 days absence per year from school
	133 days (almost 3/4 of a school year) missed over their primary school career

Hawks


This term we have been reading our very exciting book: Boy Overboard. The children are hooked! They are looking forward to finding out what will happen next.

In Maths, the Year 4 children have been learning about multiplication and division, and then fractions. We have discovered how to calculate equivalent fractions by multiplying and dividing the numerator and denominator by the same amount. The next unit is all about adding and subtracting fractions. The Year 3 children have been learning about multiplication and division, and then money. If at all possible, it would be great to continue these skills in real life and for them to use proper money in a shop! They will be working on pictograms after half term.

In Science the children have really enjoyed finding out about solids, liquids and gases. They loved predicting what would happen to different liquids when we froze them in the freezer, and we had a go at making a mini water cycle in a beaker.

The children have learnt about the hierarchy of power in Ancient Egypt and they produced some lovely hieroglyphs on their cartouche.

We are looking forward to our play – Glint of Gold – next half term, and also going to Burwell!





Wrens

The Wrens are always busy learning in their classroom and outside.

This year they have had a visit to the arctic – learning all about life there and building their own igloo, making collages of penguins and drawing polar bears. They have also visited Indi - learning all about the animals there and learnt about watercolours to paint beautiful sunsets.

Stories they have read have included The Owl Babies. With all these animals there has been a vets in the classroom so many animals have been nursed back to full health.

Phonics and maths activities also take place daily. The children have settled so well in to school and they are loving being at school (and we love having them here too).



Outside in Club

The Outside in Club runs on two lunchtimes. It is a club where children can spend time playing board games and other inside games with their friends. It is run by Mrs Webb in 'The Roost' the new name for small room off of the Kingfishers cloakroom (other small group teaching also takes place here).

It is called The Roost as this compliments The Nest – a small room off of the library. The Nest and The Roost are places that birds can live. The Nest is currently undergoing a face lift as it becomes our hub as a nurture room. It is going to be a calming environment where pastoral work can take place, supporting children with their emotional learning and needs.
